1. DISCLOSURES OF INTEREST & DISPENSATIONS

County Councillor Davies as Carmarthenshire County Council Chairman and County Planning Committee Vice Chairman; Councillor Howells as Church Warden, Member of the Parochial Church Council and Llansteffan School Governor Chairman and Council Rep, and Councillor Cooper in the event that Plas fields might be discussed, being a friend of Plas Farm tenants who store his caravan on their property.

The Chairman acknowledged the public interest in Item 10 Planning Matters, notably W/31230, 356 and proposed that W/31230 be brought forward for consideration. Members agreed.

2. W/31230 CARRIER'S FIELD HOUSING APPLICATION

At the outset, the Clerk advised the meeting that discrepancies had been discovered that day in the content of the County Council planning application, meaning that the proposed allocation of social and affordable homes had dropped from fourteen to six. Whilst the Council had locally publicised the Site Layout Plan in good faith, the discrepancies confirmed by the County Council suggested that the item would benefit from detailed consideration at a later date. Cllr. Cooper maintained that the public in attendance should have their say at the December meeting and members agreed.

Resolved

That the Council meeting be temporarily suspended for members of the public to 358 comment on W/31230 planning application for housing on Carrier's Field.

The first speaker was Cllr. Howells who declared an interest due to the proximity of his home to 359 the proposed development site and considered that he could speak but not vote on the matter. The unprofessional behaviour of the County Council as application applicant was condemned.

The following views expressed by members of the public were appreciated and noted:-

- The original Site Layout Plan was acceptable on the grounds that six social homes and eight affordable homes had been identified for development. In view of the discrepancies that had come to light and the exclusion of the affordable homes, the Council was asked to consider a Public Services Ombudsman referral.
- The provision of affordable homes was not enough; mechanisms and contracts must be 361 put in place to ensure that homes sold at affordable rates remained as affordable units within the village housing stock. Detailed criteria and mechanisms could be referred to in the Supplementary Planning Guidance available for viewing in The Stores.
- The proposed development would increase surface water flooding risks to Glan y Mor 362 homes. What additional drainage schemes were proposed by the County Council to address flood risks and how would heavy vehicles gain access to the relatively new culvert to the rear of No's 9 and 10 Glan y Mor to clear large quantities of accumulating stone, branches and debris?

The planning application percolation tests indicated that ground conditions were unlikely 363 to support soak-a-ways for surface water disposal and that the stream on the southeastern boundary 'may' cater for storm water subject to necessary approvals. Flood risk therefore remained a grave issue. 364 The ecological report recommended that the existing hedges, trees and stream should be maintained as a connected habitat, but the Site Layout Plan indicated that the stream would be separated from the trees. Development plans often change without further public consultation. There was no 365 guarantee that any approved site layout plan would be developed in practice, as Corporate Property primarily wished to secure a capital receipt from land in its ownership which benefitted from planning consent. The following views expressed by councillors were appreciated and noted:-The major issue was the exclusion of the eight affordable homes from the planning 366 application, despite detailed negotiations with Corporate Property and Housing Services during 2014. The Council must tackle the issue head-on in the public interest. Written confirmation must be obtained from Welsh Water that the existing sewerage 367 infrastructure has the capacity to cope with an additional nineteen houses. A back lane to High Street properties should be incorporated in the Site Layout Plan to 368 provide private parking spaces and thus alleviate on-road parking congestion. The Chairman thanked members and the public for their valuable contributions. 369 Resolved i) That the Council meeting be re-convened: 370 ii) That the County Council be requested to extend the period of public consultation 371 for W/31230 planning application for housing on Carrier's Field by one month in view of the discrepancies discovered in the application itself on 19th December; iii) That the Planning Committee be requested to meet in early January 2015 to 372 discuss W/31230 and provide a report to the Council meeting on 19th January. 3. MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON 17th NOVEMBER 2014 The minutes of the meeting held on 17th November were confirmed and signed as a true record. 373 4. MATTERS ARISING FOR INFORMATION Electric fence crossing 23/30 in Plas Field The Countryside Access Manager would be contacted again for clarification on the standards governing the minimum width of gaps permitting public access on rights of way where temporary electric fencing crosses the right of way. Kylsant Charitable Trust and Llanybri playground funding A further letter had been sent to Birt and Company in support of the funding application. 375 Definition of 'camping barn' in relation to The Pheasantry Camping barns would normally provide rudimentary accommodation with very basic facilities. 376 They should not entail any alterations to the exterior of the building and should be considered as, in effect, a 'stone tent'.

The County Council had granted retiring Cllr. David Thomas aged 90 (Dai Trelech) the freedom

of Carmarthenshire in recognition of his fifty years of service to the County Council. The byelection had taken place and a Plaid Cymru candidate had won the seat. Further County

10. COUNTY COUNCIL 2015/18 BUDGET CONSULTATION	
In the light of the harsh budget cuts demanded by Welsh Government of £44 million for	399
Carmarthenshire over the next three years, the County Council had issued a detailed	
consultation questionnaire for public comment. Each local councillor had been supplied with a	

copy enabling feedback both as an individual and member of the local corporate body.

Resolved

That a sub-committee comprising of Councillors Jones, Charles, Perrett and E Davies be 400 authorised to complete and submit a considered Carmarthenshire 2015/18 Budget Consultation response to meet the deadline of 4th January 2015.

11. LLANYBRI PLAYGROUND

The Playground sub-committee had met on 1st December, gave detailed consideration to the 401 designs and quotations received from the playground companies which had made site visits (Wicksteed, Hags-snp, Sunshine Playgrounds, Mant Leisure, Sovereign and The Children's Playground) and concluded that independent recommendations be sought prior to forming a shortlist. The Clerk had met with a Community Bureau grants officer who expressed interest in supporting the Council's search for grant aid to create a playground on the Heol Faen site.

Regarding the outstanding matter of concern to the solicitor dealing with the gift of land 402 transfer, namely the responsibility for fencing the playground on the two open sides to the field, independent play inspectors had advised that no additional or specific fencing would be required to meet British Standards in such a rural location with anticipated relatively low volumes of usage.

Cllr Charles informed members that the landowner intended to erect temporary sheep fencing shortly around the two open sides of the playground site, in the knowledge that ground works to level certain parts of the site may require the fencing to be removed and then re-installed on a permanent basis. A path along Heol Faen had also been dug out.

- That the solicitor dealing with the Llanybri playground gift of land transfer be i) informed that the sheep fencing on the two open sides of the site proposed by the landowner had been approved by independent play inspectors on the basis that no additional or specific fencing should be provided by the Council to meet **British Standards**;
- ii) That the Playground sub-committee be requested to report back to Council 405 following its next meeting on 12th January 2015.

12. BLACK SCAR BYWAY OPEN TO ALL TRAFFIC (BOAT) 23/39

Cllr. DB Davies declared a personal and prejudicial interest to take a safe stance on the basis 406 that he was a personal acquaintance of the farming family in question and had undertaken contracting work for the family in the past.

A letter had been received from Mwche Farm which responded to the Council's concerns as summarised below:

- 407 A new metal gate was installed at the start of the BOAT in May 2014 upon the request of the ranger, following a complaint from a member of the public. Posts and gates were supplied by us and the installation undertaken by the rangers (in the interests of maintaining public access to Black Scar).
- It has always been necessary to use this track for the purpose of farming the adjoining land. Some disruption may have been caused of late due to our ongoing fencing programme under Glastir Environmental Scheme. Livestock will have no access to the track other than to move from one field to another or to the farmyard. We intend to secure all field gates to avoid the possibility of them being left open and allowing livestock to stray onto the track.
- The wooden gate near Black Scar was padlocked some time ago by Fisheries Officers to deter illegal cockle pickers from taking vehicles on to the marsh.
- A copy letter was supplied written by County Highways Services confirming: "I have no objection to you fencing either side of the BOAT as long as a 4m width is maintained. The gates to be kept shut with cattle being kept off from entering the BOAT (except for access). The gate at the end of the BOAT to be unlocked and the overgrowth cleared – I will arrange for this work to be done".

411 Councillors remarked that as the gate and posts had been supplied by the farmer, the issue of wastage of public money had been more or less addressed, and up-dated that the padlock had since been removed from the gate leading on to Black Scar marsh.

Resolved

That the meeting be temporarily suspended for public participation

Mr Morris was asked by Pentowyn to explain the reason for installing wooden fencing along both sides of the 800 metre classified road which led to the start of the Byway. The former expanded upon the reasons given in his letter to the Council, stating that the Glastir Scheme sought to protect existing hedges and dormouse habitats. Pentowyn stressed that the new fencing was not justified, it destroyed the character of an ancient lane and the lack of passing places and open verges meant that vehicles requiring access were likely to encounter problems. The Chairman concluded matters by advising that the fencing complaint had been answered by both the County Council and Mr Morris.

13. HIGHWAY MATTERS & STREET SIGNAGE

In late November Cllr. Cooper had raised serious concerns to the clerk on behalf of many residents regarding (i) the high speed of traffic travelling along High Street and Church Road despite the 20 mph signage and (ii) the lack of progress on removing a section of double-yellow lines in Church road. The clerk reported the responses received by the Traffic Management officer as follows:- A report would be sought from the Speed Management Group and the draft traffic order for Church Road would be published in early December, to seek objections (statutory requirement) to the proposed removal of a section of double-yellow lines.

Cllr. Cooper also explained his grave concerns associated with the lack of street signage in 416 Llansteffan and Llanybri and the life-threatening situations that have arisen in the past where ambulances have been delayed by up to five minutes in locating critically ill patient's addresses. Members agreed that street signage was a basic amenity which must be provided.

Resolved

- i) That the report from the Speed Management Group for Llansteffan be obtained by 417 County Highways for consideration by Council;
- ii) That the importance of the provision of street signage in both Llansteffan and 418 Llanybri be brought to the attention of County Highways.

14. MEMORIAL SEATS

Cllr. El Davies declared an interest having acted as sub-contractor in the recent past. 419 The County Council had given written permission to remove public seats along Llansteffan sea 420 wall where the need was justified.

Resolved

That consideration be given to removing a set number of public seats in Llansteffan 421 once a year where the need was justified to free up plinths for private memorial seats.
